THEME CONCEPT

India continues to be the largest milk producing nation with an estimated milk production of around 135 million tonnes which is around 17% of the world's total milk production. India is bestowed with 190.9 and 108.7 million cattle and buffalo population contributing around 15% and 55% of total animals world's cattle and buffalo populations, respectively. Our country has about 6 lac villages which are home to 70% of country's population where animal husbandry has always been a part of social, economic and cultural life. Amongst various categories of livestock keepers the marginal, small and semi-medium farmers house predominate ownership of vast cattle genetic resources with 37 well defined breeds as well as several defined buffalo breeds. There are around 4000 goshalas, 161 cattle breeding farms, 51 semen stations, 191 frozen semen banks, 77,765 AI centres, veterinary hospitals/polyclinics and dispensaries, most of which are under different state animal husbandry departments and livestock development boards of the country. Other stakeholders like NGOs, breed associations, farmers groups and pastoralists also contribute towards enhancing the livestock productivity by providing technological support. Government of India has launched "National Dairy Plan (NDP), Rashtriya Gokul Mission, and National Livestock Mission (NLM) for strengthening infrastructure, improving indigenous cattle, and high fecundity breeds, respectively. Livestock productivity in the Chhattisgarh State is poor which contributes to a low per capita milk consumption of around 120g/day as against a national average of 300 g/day. Continuous generation and dissemination of technologies is central to sustain growth in livestock production. However, transfer of technological innovations for productivity enhancement at the livestock owner's doorsteps is very poor and a matter of serious concern. The scientific meet will therefore provide a platform to suggest a way forward for technology transfer to farmer's level.

TRAVEL PORTFOLIO

Durg is centrally located and is well connected through railway to all parts of the country. The distance from Durg railway station to CGKV campus Anjora is about 7 km. The nearest airport is Raipur which is about 65 km east of Durg. Air India, Jet airways and Indigo flies daily between New Delhi – Raipur - Nagpur, Bombay – Raipur - Kolkata, and Raipur – Hyderabad - Bangalore Airport. The College Campus, at Anjora, is about 65 km from Raipur Air Port. Taxi services are also available from Raipur Airport to Durg.

WEATHER

The weather during February end is pleasant with day and night temperature around 32°C and 22°C respectively.

PLACES OF TOURIST ATTRACTION

Nearby tourist attractions are as under:

Bastar: This near-perfect tribal land embodies a wild invitation into unexplored forests with waterfalls, wild animals, age-old temples, tribal dance and music. It is one of the most important eco-tourism destinations of the country.

Seorinarayan: The place is associated with legends in the Ramayana. The 10th/11th century temple is considered to be sacred.

Chitrakot Falls: Deep in the heart of Bastar forest, this enormous water fall plunges down from a height of 100 feet.

Dongargarh: Dongargarh is main tourist as well as pilgrimage of the Rajnandgaon District, about 75 Km. away from Durg. The famous temples of goddess Bamleshwari, is on a hilltop of 600 feet in the town of Dongargarh.

Sirpur: The 7th century Laxman temple (Dedicated to lord Vishnu) is considered as one of the finest brick temples in India.

Chhattisgarh is the State which came into existence on November 1, 2000. Good governance is the highest priority in this “Fast Track” State with both policy as well as political stability.
